Focus	There are different Still Life themes every year.  The first term's focus is on developing and exploring drawing skills and importance of sketchbooks.	In the second half term we continue our exploration of drawing skills through using different medias, responding to the Still Life display as inspiration.	Students explore colour theory and develop painting skills in the first half term, producing finished pages in their sketchbooks.	After half term students do an artist investigation of Claudette Johnson and then practise drawing portraits in their sketchbooks.	For our last project of Year 7 we explore how to draw trees within the landscape.	After half term we study a master of tree drawing, <b>Vincent Van Gogh</b> .  Students copy, analyse and write about his work before developing ideas for a final piece.
Assessment	Sketchbooks are assessed every two weeks throughout the year.  Homework is set according to policy throughout the year.  All work is assessed using GCSE levels.	Towards the end of the term all students carry out a 3-4-hour pencil drawing assessment from the still life.	At home, students produce a series of drawings of individual facial features (eyes, nose, mouth, etc). This builds skill and confidence before drawing full portraits.  These are marked in their sketchbooks.	The end of unit assessments are portraits in the style of Claudette Johnson using:  Colour Pencil Chalk Pastel or Watercolour	Assessment is in the sketchbooks during the first half term.  Work includes:  Use of a variety of drawing media.  Focus on sketchbook quality and presentation.  Tree Photography.  Drawing from life (outside).	A tree drawing in the style of <b>Van Gogh</b> , based on one of the student's photographs and/or a ceramic piece inspired by the artist.  Students spend 3-4 hours producing a final tree drawing in watercolour, pen & ink and/or a ceramic piece.  They are marked (as for all assessments) on the GCSE ladder, based on the year's work.  Students receive an overall level.
