Focus	We have a different Still Life theme every year. This half term's focus is on consolidating drawing skills in a variety of drawing medias and producing beautiful sketchbook work.	In this half term students study an artist who has specialised in printing before developing their own ideas in the artist's style, responding to the Still Life display.	In this half term, students explore colour theory linked to portraiture. They investigate and develop skills in drawing a standing figure, including drawing from life in the classroom.	In this half term, students study an artist specialising in figure such as Tanya Raabe-Webber . Students copy and analyse the artist's work before carrying out a personalised final piece, inspired by the artist investigated.	The final project in Year 9 is presented as a GCSE style unit of work. Students work in folders on sheets of paper so they can use their work if they go on to study GCSE Art. Students investigate a landscape artist, exploring and developing skills in a variety of medias.	As part of this GCSE landscape project students study Claude Monet and work towards an acrylic painting. This can be used in Year 10 if they take GCSE Art.
Assessment	At the end of this half term students carry out a 4-5-hour drawing assessment (from the still life) in pencil. Sketchbooks are assessed every two weeks. Homework is set weekly throughout the year. All work is assessed using GCSE levels.	After developing their ideas students spend the last 2-3 weeks of this half term producing a final lino print based on the still life and the artist they have investigated.	Students carry out a chalk pastel assessment drawing of a mannequin or standing figure to help them consolidate their learning about figure drawing.	The end of unit assessment for the figure project is a full figure painting or drawing. Depending on the artist students have investigated, the figure can be seated or standing.	Students carry out a number of individual drawing and photography tasks for which they are given GCSE grades.	Students work on canvas (their own) or board (provided by department). They use acrylic for the first time and have 5-6 hours to produce this piece. All Year 9 students are automatically entered into an end of KS3 landscape competition. Students awarded Ist/2nd/3rd place receive a prize and a certificate.
