## Key Messages **Do the right thing**

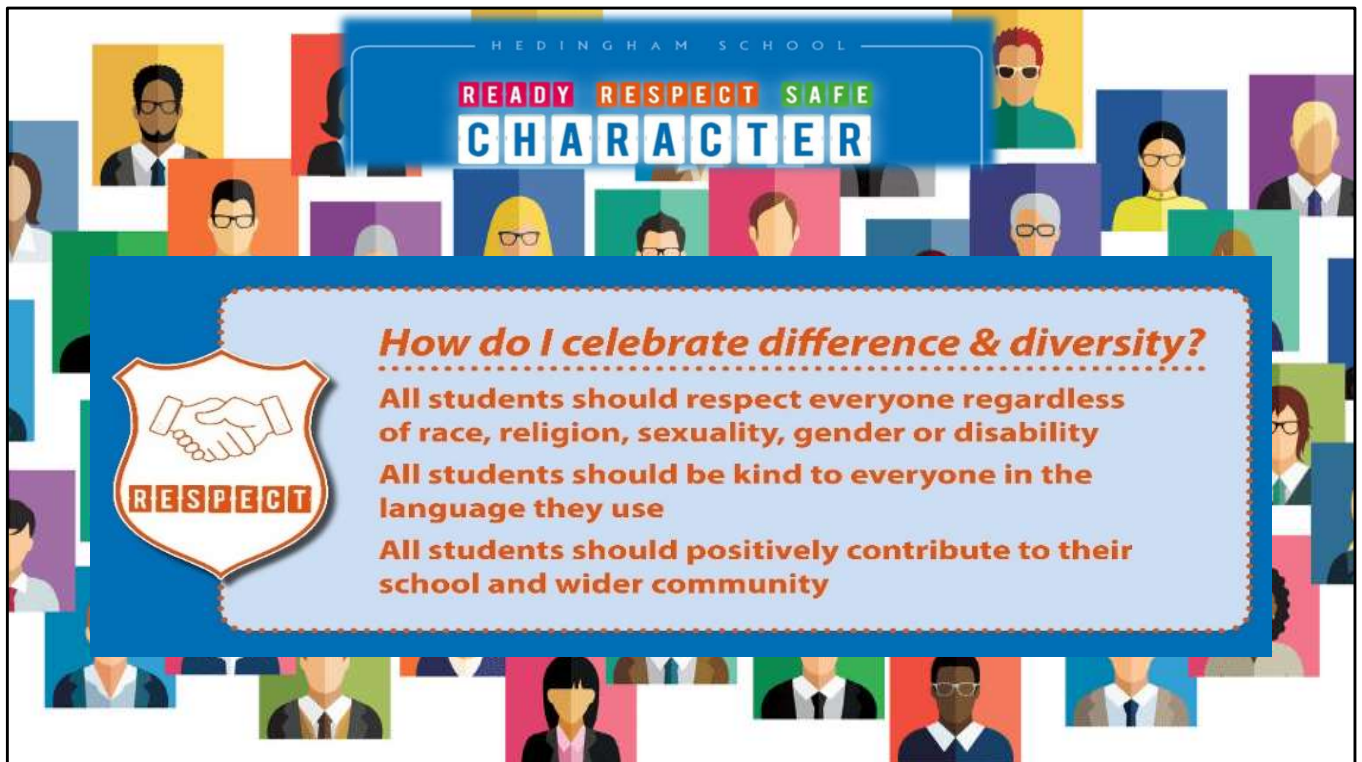
Do not bring anything into school that is an offensive weapon either to show to anyone or more seriously with intent to use it.

Do not bring any drugs (including THC) into school, either to sell or to use.

Do not ever be violent (hitting someone). It is not deserved, 'banter' or appropriate defence.

The Headteacher spoke to all year groups outlining important safeguarding messages for this term.



Students were reminded of the school's motto – 'Ready, Respect, Safe' and our character expectations. These are how we would like our students to grow and develop as young people into active citizens within our society. Students were reminded that we do not tolerate but we celebrate difference and diversity. We spoke about how we live in a global society and their generation are the most forward thinking there has ever been.



We spoke to students about how the world has changed for the better and why it has changed. We explained what stereotyping is and how that leads to prejudice and discrimination.



**Alan Turing**  
**1912-1954**



The life of Alan Turing was explained to students.

- He was one of the most famous and brilliant mathematicians to live. It's estimated that he saved between 14 and 21 million lives by ending World War 2 early.
- Turing's job was to focus on cracking the **Enigma** code. This was a code used by Nazi Germany to hide their messages, so people couldn't understand them.
- After the war, he designed the first-ever stored-program computer. This meant it was a computer that had the memory to store programs and functions.



If people had not challenged laws and views from the past, we would have the same today.

- In the penalty shoot-out that saw Italy defeat England in the UEFA Euro 2020 final, the skill of the goalkeepers was overshadowed by the perceived failure of the English players who missed their shots.
- Three young players – Marcus Rashford, Jadon Sancho and Bukayo Saka – were subjected to torrents of anti-black racist abuse.
- A tweet in response to the harassment captures this phenomenon: *When you score, you're English. When you miss, you're an immigrant.*
- In the case of the English players, it denies the reality of their birth, citizenship and cultural upbringing in England – and the history that has made the country, and Europe more widely, a profoundly mixed and ethnically diverse space.



We spoke about how English football can bring out the best and worst of what it means to be English. Three people at the height of their career who were victims of appalling abuse. We reminded students about the power of language and appropriate behaviour on social media sites.

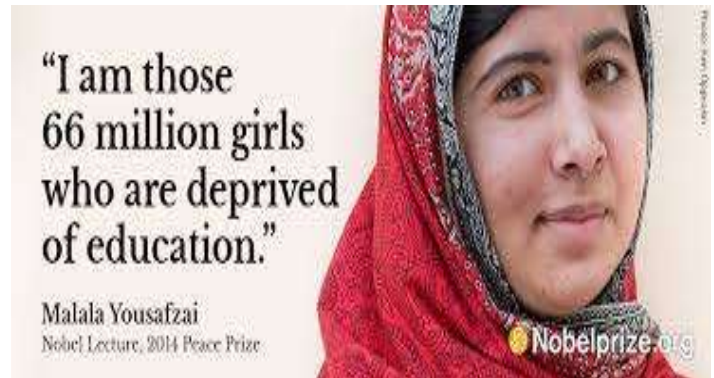


MALALA YOUSEFSI was not allowed to go to school because she was a girl/

**Malala Yousafzai** is a Pakistani female education activist and the 2014 Nobel Peace Prize laureate at the age of 17. She is the world's youngest Nobel Prize winner.

She was born in the Swat Valley in Pakistan. When the Islamic Taliban movement took control of the valley in 2008, girls' schools were burned down. Malala kept a diary of the events, which was published in 2009 by BBC Urdu. In her diary she spoke out against the Taliban's terrorist regime.

It was not long before the Taliban threatened her life. In 2012, Malala was shot in the head on a school bus by a Taliban gunman. She survived but had to flee to England and live in exile.

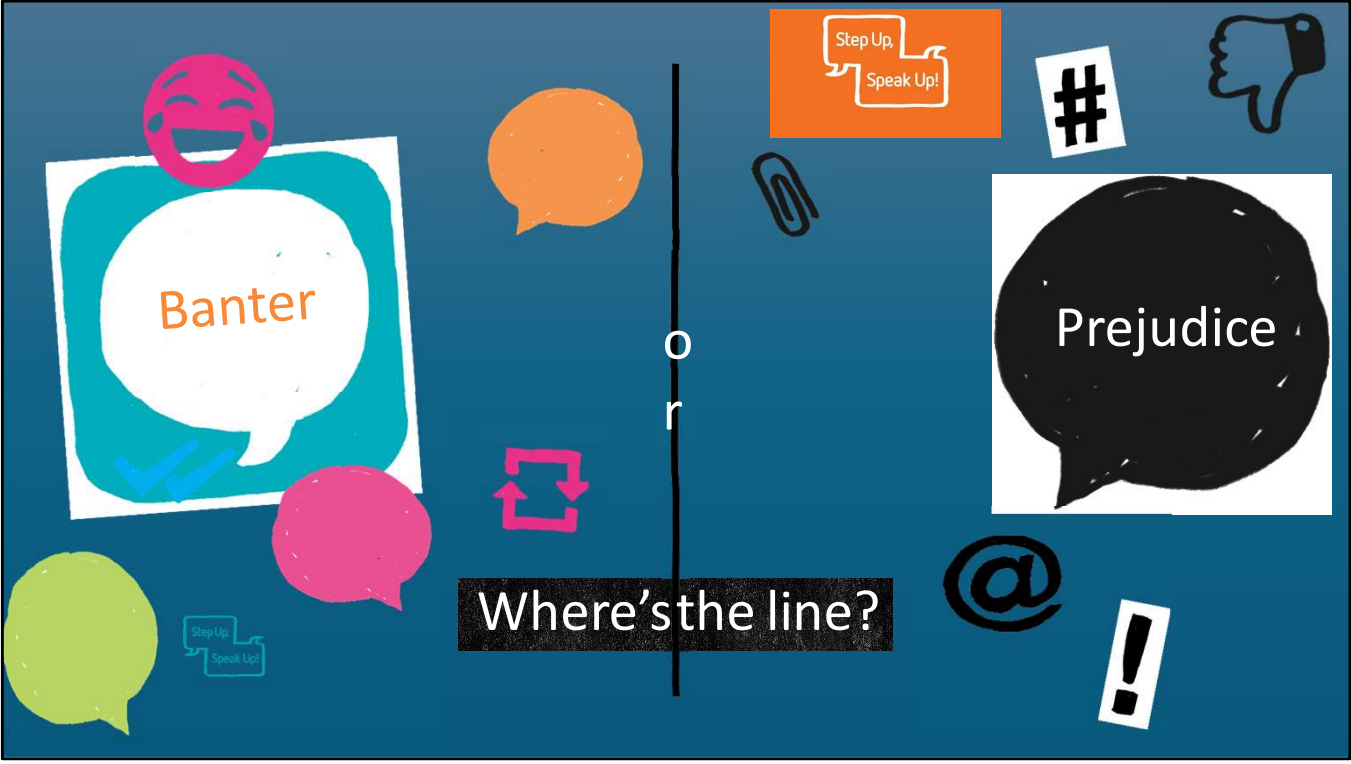


We spoke about how a girl who lived in the Pakistan stood up for the rights of girls to have an education.

**Verbal abuse involves using words to name call, bully, demean, frighten, intimidate, or control another person.**

**Prejudicial language can be defined as words or acts based on preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience.**

**Words and phrases that tend to stereotype individuals, groups, races, or nationalities..**

**Words that relate to, or characterized by sex or sexuality, race, religion or physical appearance.**

**Derogatory comments are comprised of words that tend or intend to detract, disparage or belittle and can often be considered offensive. Derogatory words have the power to hurt.**



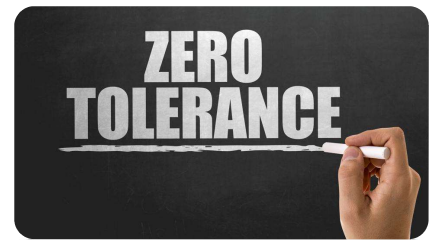
This is not school specific. You will find these rules in schools, universities, workplaces, social media platforms and within the law.

  - It **sets out the personal characteristics that are protected by the law and the behaviour that is unlawful.**

## Behaviour Policy



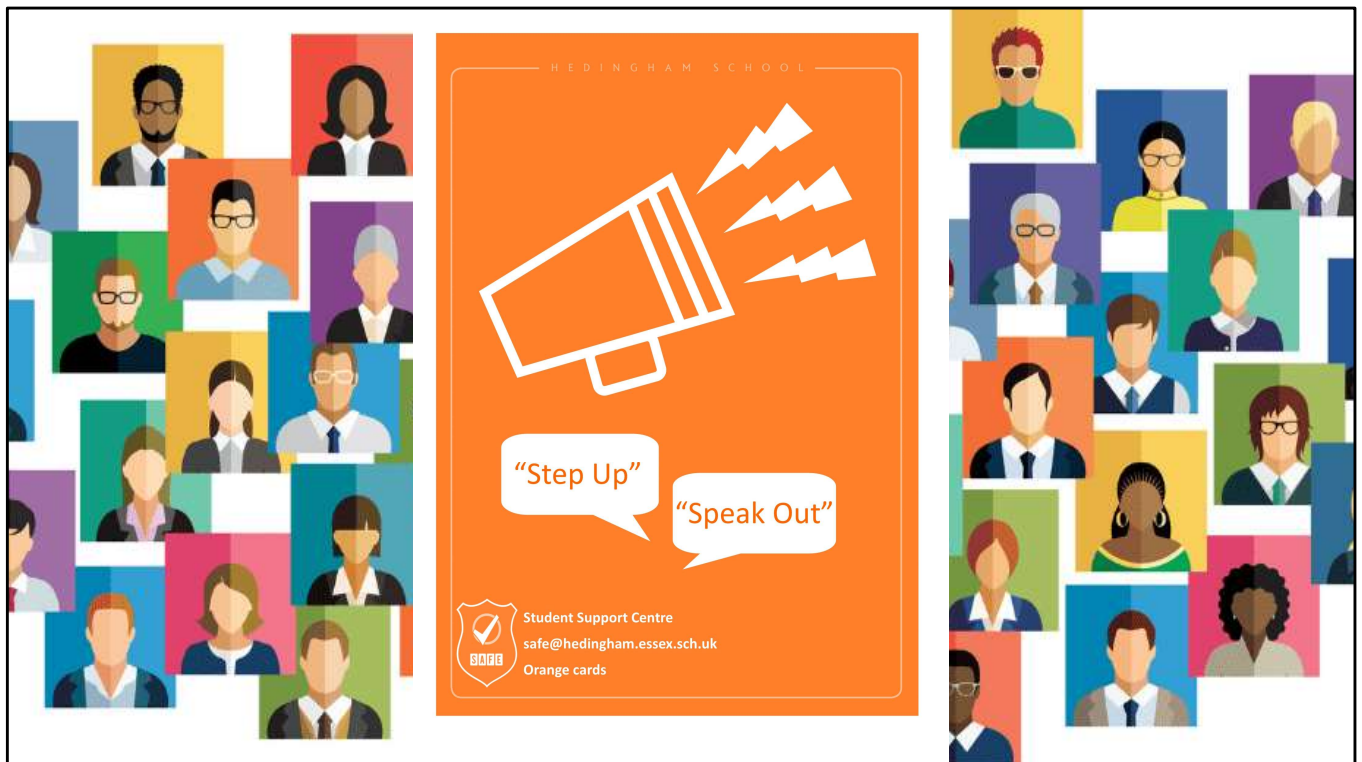
### **The school defines harmful behaviour as:**

Verbally abusive (and may include anti-social language/swearing/racist/homophobic/transphobic/sexist abuse)

### **Serious breaches of our school mission and aims is defined as:**

Racist, sexist, homophobic, transphobic or discriminatory behaviour.

**In some instances, these could lead to permanent exclusion.**



Above anything else, you have a duty to report any prejudice related or anti-social behaviour whether you are the victim or a witness. Part of school is also to educate individuals on the impact of the language they use. We must stand up and speak out within our school community.

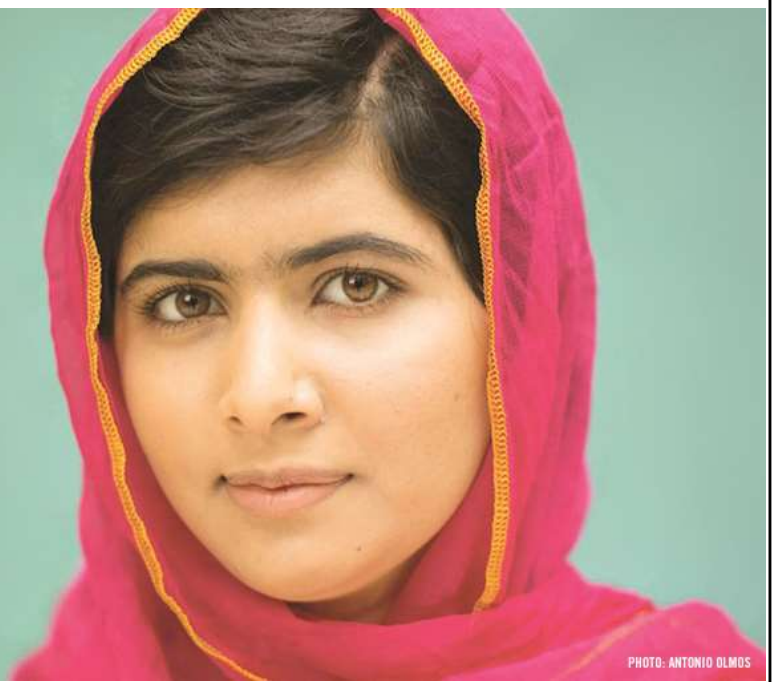
